At the Annual Parish Meeting in April, the Chairs of the Council and committees were given the opportunity to reflect on the past year. The presentations can be accessed on the wanborough.info website.

Challenges encountered over the last 12 months included the reopening of Wanborough

Road, flooding, the transfer of services from the Borough to the Parish, and the resignation of clerks and councillors. All of the councillors, including new councillors Debra Maslin and Martin Rowley have stepped up and worked together to fill the void left by Angela Raymond's departure.

Highlights from the year included the match funding of upgrades and equipment for the sports clubs, such as tennis floodlights and new goal posts. Additionally, fencing has been installed around the Church Meadow play area. Improvements have been made to the Hoopers Field building, including the addition of WiFi and the installation of security cameras. Yoga in the park has become a regular Sunday activity, open to all villagers.

Tracy Smith, our new clerk, has overseen the retender process for Hoopers Field and our village maintenance contracts, which have now been awarded. Tracy is also working closely with the councillors to implement new systems, processes, and accounting procedures. She directs Graham, our village maintenance man, who does an excellent job looking after our footpaths and carrying out minor repairs around the village.

In recent weeks, the Council has supported a litter pick and made additions to, as well as replenishments of, the flower troughs. Thanks to ClIr Gary Sumner and Lorna Naseem for

driving these initiatives. By the time this is published, the troughs at the allotments, stolen after recent vandalism, should have been replaced and securely anchored to prevent future incidents.

Under the leadership of Cllr Richard Bellamy, a Duke of Edinburgh volunteer will assist us in checking all our footpaths and cataloguing any overgrown or obstructed routes and stiles, or signs in need of repair. In the coming weeks, the Council hopes to award a resurfacing contract for the Hoopers Field driveway and looks forward to welcoming Bonny back for another season of Park Yoga.

Tracy, our clerk, is always available via phone or email during working hours, Monday to Friday, on 07588 769829 or <u>clerk@wanborough.info</u>, and is often available to meet at Hoopers Field on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. There is still a vacant councillor position on the Council, so please feel free to speak with Tracy if you are interested.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner: Next Ward Surgery is 29th June 9-10am

Re-elected to represent Ridgeway Ward:

Thank you to residents who took the time to vote on the 2nd May. I was re-elected to represent the Ward for the 3rd time until May 2026, when there will be 'all out' elections in the Borough of Swindon for the first time. I supported the Labour administration in this change which means that all 57 councillors will be elected for a four-year term, rather than by thirds. The advantage for this is that the administration (of whichever political colour) can make longer term decisions for the benefit of the Borough. I've also been re-elected as Leader of the Conservative Group.

Planning: A second (revised slightly) planning application to construct a Bio-Compressed Natural Gas HGV refuelling facility for HGV's on what is farmland at Purley Road, Liddington has been submitted with another request as to whether an 'Environmental Impact Assessment' is required. I have submitted my view that the nature of the application is little changed and one is still required.

School Safety Zones: The Wanborough scheme is now in place and I met with officers in site in April, together with our local policing team. All went generally well and some words of advice were given. The re-surfacing of the driveway at Hooper's Field should be done soon and that will assist the school and parents with a suitable venue to 'park & stride' to school.

There are 20mph zones agreed for The Beanlands & Magdalen Road which will be implemented in due court and a consultation for Bishopstone ending early June.

Planning News Developers at Lotmead have appealed against 'non determination' as agreement wasn't reached on the flooding/drainage strategy. SBC and the developers have some time to try to work through concerns, but I think it's imperative that a suitable method of attenuation is put in place to protect future residents.

We are awaiting the start of the new Primary School at Redlands Grove which has been delayed by the decision of the Diocese of Bristol's decision to pull out of running schools and new Trusts are being approached to take over the project which has planning consent.

Waste & Recycling: Swindon Borough Council have got the service back to collecting on schedule mainly, but as always – please let me know if you are missed – as a resident you only have 24 hours to report a missed collection. New residents at Redlands Grove should let me know if the bins they order aren't delivered.

The guest speaker at the May meeting was Robert McGuigan, a senior paramedic with local Ambulance Services who demonstrated many of the techniques needed to apply effective CPR and uses of Defibrillator machines (as often found in the community.) Rob quoted that after a cardiac arrest the patient has a 10% survival rate; but with the quick intervention of CPR and/or application of a defibrillator machine the survival rate could increase to 60%. His clear message was always to attempt to apply the techniques he showed us, and possibly save a life.

He brought 4 Resuscitation models for the members to try these techniques on under his supervision. One of the questions to him concerned the possibility of compressing too hard on the chest area and his definite reply was 'better some broken ribs than to die without someone trying to keep the person alive'.

Oh, and it might also be a good idea to pay attention to where Our Great Leader is, up ahead and far away, so that nobody takes a wrong turning and gets lost. Or left behind. Or is confused by where the track actually goes. No, no, don't get muddled by thinking you're still in the church. That really IS stained glass in the hedgerow.

And the muffled laughter from the stragglers at the back is to do with poo. A car's number plate spells out the letters POO. How could you possibly live with that? Well, very easily, says the owner, if your actual job is to collect the bins and the rubbish and the everything else. It's who I am. The poo man.

More shaking of heads over the field of cattle ahead. One inquisitive brown creature came close to the wire to inspect these intruders. . " Be careful. He looks very fierce. Just what is it about eyesight and creatures half- spotted on these walks? No, that's not a six- legged cow under the tree over there. Look properly. See that little face lower down? That's a calf, standing behind its mother.

And so to Priscilla's Kitchen. It's warm and dry inside and the counter is piled ready for the soggy walkers. The group divides into healthy eaters (spinach, chicken, salads, tap water) and the cake guzzlers (Bakewell Tart, and oh yes, more Bakewell tart).

Dogs fight, people laugh, and the place is full. And that weather forecast? It's two o'clock. Yes, a change in the weather, exactly as they said. Rain not just started, but just stopped. One day they'll get it right.

'The Cross Keys'

<u>By 'Le Bon Mangeur'</u>

This month we are back in Wanborough, with a visit to the Cross Keys in Burycroft. When Karianne and Nathan Lee left in October 2022, after less than a year, it seemed that this pub was going to be closed for good. However, after a sad period of nearly one and half years, new landlords Adam and Sonja Travers seem to be breathing new life into this once popular hostelry.

A pub has been open on this site since before 1861 and it was once combined with a grocer's shop. During the first World War the licensee kept and killed pigs on the premises. It was rebuilt in the 1930s, the old pub being demolished to create what is now a spacious beer garden.

On phoning the pub to book a table mid-afternoon, the call wasn't answered, so I resorted to using the online ResDiary, which worked well. We visited on a Saturday evening and the pub wasn't busy. On arrival, you are asked to log your car number plate but the system wasn't working at the time. Is this really necessary?

Adam and Sonja have spent quite some time travelling and are both seasoned chefs. Adam has been running pubs for over 30 years and Sonja for the last 12. The pub reopened in February this year and the menu is a mix of 'pub classics' with some other interesting dishes from different parts of the world. Sonja brings an Italian influence with several family recipes being included.

The 'Cross Keys' is a Wadworth's house, so I enjoyed a cool pint of 'Horizon' which was hoppy and zesty. My better half chose an elderflower cordial. Adam and Sonja should have a quiet word with the powers that be at Wadworth's HQ, with a view to creating a better wine list. There are only five white wines, two of which are Sauvignon Blanc. Some more information about the wines would also be helpful. We picked out the 'Paddock Chardonnay', an Australian wine which was fruity and fresh.

According to the pub website, there is a 'fresh and seasonal approach' to the food served with local ingredients being used where possible, so hopefully no Brake Bros lorries in sight! To kick off, we shared the 'Chilli Chicken' and the 'Asian Duck Bao Buns'. The 'Chilli Chicken' was really good with a crispy coating of breadcrumbs and a nice chilli 'hit'. The 'Bao Buns' were pillowy soft and well-filled with moist duck. For our mains, I picked the 'Beef Short Rib' and my wife the 'Chicken Parmesan'.

The beef had been slow braised and was very tender, served with a velvety veal stock gravy. My wife reported that her chicken

was well cooked and that the tomato pasta sauce was smooth and full of flavour. To finish off the meal, we shared a 'Cartmel Sticky Toffee Pudding', which was suitably sticky and served with vanilla ice-cream.

The 'Cross Keys' is a large pub inside and sometimes big spaces can make it hard to create a cosy atmosphere. Light background music and a sensible seating plan helped, but it would have been great to have had some more filled tables. We were looked after brilliantly by Beth and Bethany and the food was served quickly and with a smile. It's also dog friendly, so we plan to re-visit in the summer and eat out in the garden.

Wanborough Primary School

Reception started the term with their *roarsome* topic of dinosaurs learning about carnivores, herbivores and omnivores. They read lots of dinosaur books and even received a visit from a T-Rex! The children are now learning about minibeasts and went on a hunt for them around the school. In class the children are looking after a set of

caterpillars, raising them into butterflies. The children have been learning about dynamics in music and have listened to *Beethoven's 5th Symphony* and *It's Oh So Quiet* by Bjork. They have learnt the meanings of forte, piano, crescendo and diminuendo and played percussion to demonstrate their understanding. In RE they have learnt about belonging to a community and about baptism.

Year 1 have been exploring fairy tales and traditional tales with the aim of writing their own tales by the end of the term. In Art they have been learning about the artist Andy Goldsworthy and in Science the children have been learning about seasonal change.

Year 2 made fabulous 'parrots for pirates' out of clay and wrote instructions on 'How to be a Pirate' as part of English. They have learnt about Blackbeard and Anne Bonny, pirate ships and clothing, and they enjoyed dressing up and doing piratey things for their WOW day. In RE the children have been learning about the difference between Easter and Eid-ul-fitr, comparing the Christian and Muslim religions. In Maths the children have been learning about measure – length, mass and capacity. In Music they explored film composing creating a piece of music to accompany a short Charlie Chaplin film.

Year 3 have been studying Egyptians and for their WOW day they dressed as Egyptians and received a special visitor. In Science they have been studying plants and in Art they have been looking at the work of Jackson Pollock. The whole class has also started a course of weekly swimming lessons at Dorcan.

Year 4 have been learning about and practising Ancient Greek pottery techniques, looking at the laid-technique and blending pieces together. In Science they have explored decay – putting eggs into different liquids to see which is worse for our teeth (coke, water or juice).

Year 5 have been learning a Balinese Gamelan in music creating their own with percussion instruments. In Art they have been learning about Van Gogh and creating their own versions of *Starry Night*. Within their topic of The Natural World the children have been writing a descriptive river setting for a larger piece of work. As part of Science on metamorphosis the class has been studying the different stages of the life cycle of a butterfly with a set of live caterpillars which they have watched transform into chrysalides and emerge as butterflies. Year 5 have been enjoying weekly swimming lessons at Dorcan pool.

Year 6 have worked very hard preparing for SATs. The children completed tests in Spelling, Reading, Arithmetic, Maths Reasoning (2 papers) and Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar. In Art they completed their Frida Kahlo portraits. In DT they created bridges to span the Amazon River and in History they learnt about the Maya people – Who were they? Where did they live? What was their life like?

Wiltshire Air Ambulance visited the school and each class received Emergency Awareness Training. This included CPR, Recovery Position and making an emergency call. The training was really engaging and could prove vital in an emergency situation. As a charity, Wilthire Air Ambulance are grateful for any donations to keep this service flying!

The Whole School participated in an art exhibition held at North Swindon Library featuring art work from all years across the school as well as other schools from the Blue Kite Academy Trust.

Following the school's decision last June to become an academy we are moving closer to our proposed joining of The Blue Kite Academy Trust. We are already benefiting from working closely with the trust's central team and partner schools and we are looking forward to becoming fully on board in readiness for the new academic year.

Once again in June our Year 6 children will be heading to France for their Year 6 residential. The school was successful in applying for Turing Scheme funding which awarded the school significant funding to enable the trip to happen once again and without any expense for our parents. We have everything crossed that our 2024 application will be successful too.

Monthly Musings

Have you noticed that some plants appear to move? You've put them in one spot, turned your back for a week /season / year or two and they've relocated! One reason for this phenomenon is that the misplaced plants are annuals and have simply set seed and died back, so your perceived moved plants are actually new ones.

Allowing some plants to self-seed is very satisfying and watching their ebb and flow is a welcome distraction from the pile of paperwork that awaits. It's fun to let an element of chance into the garden and see what happens – and as a designer, it takes a lot for me to say that!



You can always intervene by rubbing out too many seedlings or relocating young plants to a new spot.

I've listed a few well-behaved self seeders that you might like to try in this month's plant spotlight.

Plant Spotlight: Four RHS experts favourite self-seeders that won't take over.

Charlie Harpur, head gardener at the Knepp Estate, west Sussex recommends these plants for impoverished soil: Primula veris (Cowslip). Seseli elatum subsp. Osseum (Mountain Fennel) and Lotus hirsutus AGM (Hairy canary Clover)







Andrea Brunsendorf, head gardener at Lowther castle, Cumbria favourites for sunny free draining spaces include:

Persicaria orientalis, Erigerion annuus and Papaver dubium subsp. Lecogii 'Albiflorum' commonly known as 'Beth's poppy' after Beth Chatto.



Derry Watkins, plants woman and nursery owner suggests Geranium nodosum for dry shade and Verbascum roripifolium for sunny spots with good drainage.

Finally, Sue Mabberley runs Nant-y -bedd woodland garden in the Brecon Beacons. She's noticed that Digitalis purpurea (Common Foxgloves), Deschampsia cespitosa (Tufted hair grass) and Hesperis matronalis (Sweet rocket) all manage the shade and self-seed freely through the gardens.

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
The Potting Shed: Things to do in May / June

- Plant out summer bedding from the end of May onwards.
- Earth up potatoes
- Hoe off weeds in vegetable patches
- Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days
- Lift and divide overgrown clumps of daffodils and other spring flowering bulbs.
- Start to plan your hanging baskets-they could be used for strawberries, tomatoes or even Hostas.





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Wanborough during World War Two

As we prepare to celebrate the 80th anniversary of D-Day I thought it might be a good time to look back at the information about Wanborough during WW2 gathered for the planned celebrations of the 75th anniversary of VE Day in May 2020. Those celebrations during a bank holiday weekend included a planned display in St Andrew's church by the History Group but had to be cancelled because of the pandemic and lockdown.

Bevin Boys

The story of the Bevin Boys is a sad and largely overlooked contribution of almost 50,000 18 to 24 year old men from 1943 to 1948.

The UK was highly dependent on coal at the start of WW2, not only to power ships and trains but also for generating electricity and heating homes. In the first half of 1942 industrial relations in the coal industry were poor and there were several local strikes over wages across the country. In response, the government increased minimum weekly pay and a bonus scheme was proposed to reward workers in mines that exceeded their output targets. These measures resulted in an increase in production in the second half of 1942 although volumes were still short of the amount of coal required.

During the early years of the war the Government had compounded the problem by conscripting 36,000 fit young miners into the armed forces and they were generally not replaced because other likely recruits were also being conscripted.

Although there were Volunteers or Optants who chose to become miners, by the middle of 1943 the country faced a critical shortage of coal and when coal stocks reached just three weeks' supply the Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, charged Ernest Bevin, Minister of Labour and National Service, to find a way to increase coal production.

Bevin's solution was that from all 18 to 24 year old conscripts one in ten were selected to work in the coal mines from 14th December 1943, a process organised by one of Bevin's secretaries who each week pulled a digit 0-9 from a hat. All men liable for call-up that week whose National Service registration number ended in that digit, with few exceptions, were known as Ballotees, and later Bevin Boys, and directed to work in the mines or face imprisonment.

Those selected were allocated accommodation in either a purpose built Miners Hostel, similar to an army camp, or billeted out to a private home. They were issued with a safety helmet, overalls and a pair of steel capped boots and instructed to report to a training centre where any with no previous experience of mining were given six weeks training, four in a classroom setting and two at their assigned colliery.

They did a filthy and dangerous although vitally important job but were poorly treated but when demobbed, Bevin Boys

received none of the benefits given to conscripts who had seen active service who had the right to go back to their previous jobs, were awarded service medals, received clothes in exchange for their uniforms, marched in Memorial Day parades and were admired by the nation. If a Bevin Boy was killed in a mining accident, his family received no compensation and those invalided out received no pension. Bevin Boys carried no formal form of identification nor wore a uniform so many people did not know that they had been conscripted and labelled them as "Conchies", the slang term used at the time for conscientious objectors and when they returned home had to suffer abuse from locals with accusations that they were deliberately avoiding



military conscription. When peace was declared in 1945 Bevin Boys were not demobbed with the rest of the conscripted troops as England still needed coal, so it was not until 1948, nearly three years after the cessation of hostilities, that the coal-workers were finally released.

Another consequence of the lack of recognition of the important role Bevin Boys played was the destruction of most official records in the 1950's, apart from the Midlands Region which have been kept by National Archives. The role played by Bevin Boys in Britain's war effort was not fully recognised until 1995, 50 years after VE Day, when Queen Elizabeth II mentioned them in a speech and it was not until 2007 that the Government announced that Bevin Boys would be recognised with a medal granted to all conscripts that worked in the mines. Finally, in 2013 a memorial to the Bevin Boys was unveiled in the National Memorial Arboretum at Alrewas, Staffordshire.

Cecil "Jack" Morse

Statistically there could have been several young men from Wanborough sent to the mines but this is difficult to check because of the destruction of official records.

However, anecdotal reports suggest that Cecil Morse, known as Jack to his family, was Balloted to be a Bevin Boy. Jack lived in the cottage next to St Andrew's church with his father Sidney from Farringdon and mother Elsie and three sisters. It seems that when he was de-mobbed Jack lived in Swindon

Danger of 20mph Zone in Liddington

There's been talk of reducing the minimum speed through Liddington from 30mph to 20mph. Most villagers welcome it. My concern is for Kay Archer.

She's been getting around just fine with her walking stick. But when she gets into her Suzuki Carry Van she morphs into Stirling Moss. Visualise her with racing glasses and helmet, a cool driver, taking the corner at The Village Inn and on to her driveway without missing a beat. 20mph? I don't think so.



Kay is an Essex girl. She came to Liddington when her father worked for the RAF building runways. Father built the house she lives in now. The original Bell Inn was where her garage is. Kay's one regret is that the current pub was renamed The Village Inn. Perhaps Adam, the landlord, might change it back to The Bell.

Kay married Basil Archer from 17 The Street in 1959 and they had two sons, Ted and Adam.

She had a long career from operating a cement mixer for

her father, to working in the Post Office and NHS hospital exchanges, retiring when she was 75.

Her fingerprints are on building the Village Hall and sewing the Millenium map of Liddington. And she has stories. Recently she engaged me with photo albums of village life that Basil had collected. We'll digitise them for the village web site and hopefully record the memories of all those activists.

And Kay is still involved, one of the stalwarts for Village Hall events, welcoming villagers at the door, arm-wrestling them

to buy raffle tickets, ever-so quiet, persistent, very much-admired. She is Liddington's national institution.



This poem, published some years back, captured a moment that was a tough loss for Kay. It was a morning in 2015 on a winter shoot. A flock of swans flew over, their sad honking had an inauspicious, spine-tingling effect.

Nothing Ever Hurts You Forever for Kay

That winter day on *Way Sands* the professional photographer clicked away but said nothing.

A shade in our peripheral edge willed us to swivel to his eye away from the quick of partridge


to a slow canal boat behind us and later again to a fast train, and later still to the wild swans

with their ponderous wing-span honking a terse goodbye captured forever in a photograph

taken over the ploughed ruts, over the half-leaved winter trees heading early morning into low sun

around the hour that Basil died. If we'd known we would have seen them as a cortege carrying his life,

doffed our hats to a happy re-birth before trying to find our own balance, feet mud-sucking the sodden earth

CHISELDON LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 19th June 2024 in the Church Hall, Butts Rd, SN4 ONN at 7.30 p.m. when the subject is "Ticket to Ride – Victorian Railways" presented by Judy Rouse. In Victorian times, Britain's railway network grew rapidly. In the 1840s 'Railway Mania' saw a frenzy of investment and speculation. Huge amounts were spent on building the railways from 1845 to



1900, extending the network throughout the nation. By 1870, 423 million passenger journeys were taking place annually on 16,000 miles of track. The railway system offered new chances for travel, holidays, transporting goods, developing businesses and the growth of towns and cities. The distance between town and countryside was erased. Dairy produce and fish could be delivered easily to different parts of the country within hours. Increased communication allowed for the spread of ideas and national newspapers. A standardized time was introduced across Britain as trains were timetabled. The mobility of labour and maintenance of law and order were made easier. Of course, the railway network also stimulated the coal and iron industries but led to the decline of the canal system. Judy will tell us all about this story. Come along and get a flavour of what it was like to travel during this period.
